What Happened Last Sunday?

Last Sunday at the 11:00 mass we celebrated two rites with our catechumens and candidates, which are the unbaptized and baptized respectively. The first was the **Rite of Lenten Renewal**. Here the candidates ask to begin this final period of their preparation, and to be supported by the prayer and example of Resurrection. They were called by name and their sponsors testified that they are ready to become fully initiated into the Catholic Church. They were told to be “one with us” during this season. Through prayer, fasting, and works of charity, we will all become united more closely to Christ, and come to know in a deeper way the power of the Resurrection in us. “We assure you

of our support by prayers and example during this holy season: concluded Father Steve. Those are some pretty big shoes to fill!

Immediately proceeding this was the **Rite of Sending**, where the catechumens who are journeying towards their baptism ask for recognition for the progress that they have made in their spiritual formation. In this rite, the godparents are asked to testify. “Have these catechumens taken their formation in the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ and in the Catholic way of life seriously?” – Not an easy task for any of us – to which the godparents answered a resounding, “They have!”

Last week you were made aware of a critical election that took place on Sunday March 5th at Holy Rosary Cathedral at 3:00. There was only one person who had the necessary credentials to vote, Archbishop Donald Bolen. He did not take this vote lightly after consulting various catechists, godparents, and sponsors, and asking some very tough questions, he was able to welcome numerous catechumens to become our **Newly Elect**. Here at Resurrection Parish we are blessed to have seven Elect.

Other than the fact that the Bishop, shepherd of our diocese, has called them to be part of the Elect where did this term come from. We went straight to the horse's mouth, the Catholic Rites Today, book tells us that “on the basis of the testimony of godparents and catechesis and of the other catechumen's reaffirmation of their intention, the Church judges their state of readiness and decides on their advancement towards the sacraments of initiation. Thus the Church makes its “election,” that is, the choice and admission of those catechumens who have the disposition that make them fit to take part, and the next major celebration, in the sacrament of initiation” page. 82.
